# Community-supported Forestry Firewood Project

Driven by climbing fossil fuel prices, concerns about global climate change, and peak oil, Vermonters are increasingly interested in alternatives to fossil fuels, including wood for home heating. It's a sensible choice in our forested landscape, one that can boost our local economy and reduce our dependence on imported fuels. Vermont Family Forests's raison d'être is to conserve local forest health, so we want to make sure that the harvesting of that fuelwood occurs in a way that thinks beyond "getting the wood out" and safeguards the health of Vermont's forests.

Modeled after the highly successful Community-Supported Agriculture movement, our Community-Supported Forestry Firewood Program will connect customers who care about forest health and want to act upon that concern with firewood from landowners who are practicing exemplary forest management, verified through Vermont Family Forests's certification program.

Last fall, a team of Middlebury College students offered their help and insights to the project, creating an on-line survey to assess the current woodburning habits of fuelwood customers and to gauge the level of interest among customers, forest landowners, and firewood processors in the concept of marketing certified, Family Forest® firewood. We were amazed by the volume of survey responses and were gratified to see that interest in the Community-supported Forestry Firewood Project is very strong. We encourage you to review the survey results on our website.

It became clear to us that, in order for this project to succeed, we need to create a business model that meets the needs of loggers and firewood processors. In late January, we met with seven local firewood processors to hear their thoughts about how the Firewood Project might work, to identify potential constraints, and discuss ways to mitigate them. Many important points emerged. Most firewood processors would like help with firewood marketing. They are interested in developing mutually beneficial relationships between customers and processors, and they're interested in collaborative value-adding.

With the feedback from that enormously helpful meeting, we will be developing a business plan for the project, which we hope to complete by the spring. We'll keep you posted as this exciting project unfolds.

## The Results are In!

Heartfelt thanks to all of you who completed our on-line firewood survey—we had 216 respondents! All survey respondents were entered into a drawing, the winner of which receives a two-hour forest consultation with David Brynn, VFF's executive director. Congratulations to Peg Rood of Lincoln, who won that drawing.

An energetic and creative team of Middlebury College students conducted the survey for us. **You can view their findings on our website** "Research and Demonstration" page. Two of their many findings:

\*Of the 144 forestland owners who responded to the survey, 77% produce their own firewood.

\* 33% of surveyed fuelwood users purchase their wood, and 95% of these are interested in buying wood from carefully tended forests.

*We stand at a threshold in energy consumption. For a window of time, we have the opportunity to prepare for a post-oil future and create a considered, holistic vision of a sustainable local energy economy. In our region, this economy will, appropriately, include wood biomass. Now is our chance to "get it right," to conceive a relationship with wood energy that is anchored in SELF-sufficiency: Sustainable, Efficient, Local, and Fair.*

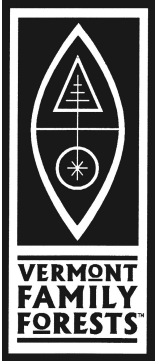

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## News Briefs from the Forest

### **A New, Green Home for the Green Mountain Club**

Four years after fire destroyed their Waterbury headquarters, the Green Mountain Club is poised to rebuild. Vermont Family Forests is working with GMC to provide certified timber for their new headquarters. Working in prime, frozen winter conditions, logger Bill Torrey is cutting white pine and hemlock from two Bristol forests in VFF's certified forest pool, owned by Rick and Sandy Desorda and Ron and Karen McEachen. Redstart Forestry in Orange County will provide additional certified hemlock for the project. The new headquarters will house an exhibit telling the story of the collaborative process and community-supported forestry that yielded the building's framing.

### **Certified Ecoforestry Update**

We're delighted to welcome Kinny Perot into the Vermont Family Forests certified forest pool. Andy Carlo, of Fountain Forestry, prepared the certified management plan and map for Kinny's forests in Waitsfield and Warren. In January, VFF met with sisters from the Green Mountain Monastery to discuss ecological management of their Greenboro forestland. Inspired by the teachings of theolo-

gian and ecological philosopher, Thomas Berry, the sisters are consulting with VFF to develop an ecological approach to their forest management.

### **Conservation Beyond the Grave**

One innovative way for land-owning conservation organizations to earn revenue is to offer the opportunity for people to inter the remains or scatter the ashes of a loved one on the conserved property. A team of University of Vermont students are conducting a study to explore the opportunities and constraints of this idea, using the Waterworks Property in Bristol, one of VFF's certified forests, as a test case.

### **Seasonal Workers in the Northern Forest**

Nationally, seasonal workers make up over 50% of the forest work force. Vermont Family Forests is applying for grant funds for a study entitled, "The Role of Seasonal Forest Workers in the Conservation and Use of the Once and Future Northern Forest." This study will assess the historical and present-day role of seasonal forest workers in forest restoration, conservation, and sustainable harvest. It will also identify opportunities and constraints associated with employing local and immigrant seasonal forest workers in forest conservation and biomass harvest.
